The Session passed an asking budget of \$311,855 at their meeting on October 12. Details of the proposed budget are posted on Stewardship's Bulletin Board in the Narthex. A Town Hall meeting was held after the Sunday


Morning Services on October 24 and representatives of each Church Ministry gave a short presentation about their Ministry's request and answered questions. The Budget anticipates pledges to increase 5% over the current year but spending is anticipated to increase by 7%. The 2% difference will be made up from other sources. For example the Florence Foote bequest will fund the proposed part time educational position which will concentrate on youth activities in an effort to get more youth involved in our activities. This is vital if the Church is to grow and progress. The cost of many of the other services continue to rise, such as utilities, up \$2000 per year over and above the already \$24,000 per year cost so it takes more money just to keep the doors open. Please give this your prayerful consideration and do all you can to contribute to continue our valuable contribution to this community.



ROOF

The Fellowship Hall project officially got under way on the afternoon of Monday Oct. 11. The HVAC contractor began taking down the existing HVAC duct work inside Fellowship Hall. Ultimately this will be replaced by a 24 inch and smaller pipe that will circle the Hall to distribute hot and cool air much more efficiently and quietly without blowing the papers off your table. This will all be hidden by a sofit that will come out from the existing wall approximately 36 inches and then turn up vertically for about 36 inches. The pipe will be inside this along with lighting that will send light both up toward the ceiling and down toward the floor. In addition to this "hidden lighting" there will be six large hang down modern chandlers. When finished you will be able to easily read in the room even at night meetings. Cont. on page 9



The ceiling will be finished with tongue and grove boards stained somewhat lighter than the existing beams but of the same basic color. It should look a lot like the Sanctuary but much lighter. Also the boards will be attached in horizontal rows and not at an angle like the Sanctuary. By the time you read this we should be well into putting up the ceiling boards. We are still planning on being finished by the end of this year. You will be able to see the progress each Sunday at Fellowship as we plan to continue to hold that event in the Hall as much as possible. A few chairs will be provided for those who can't stand to be able to sit but during the construction it will be necessary for most of us to stand which will provide a better opportunity to move around and talk with others. By January 2011 we should be able to return to our normal routine in a new and much better Fellowship Hall. Thanks to one and all for your donations and patience without which this would not have been possible.

New Refrigerator for Kitchen Stewardship budget dollars purchased our new refrigerator which arrived just as the Food Pantry needed storage for 30 cases of cheese. The new Energy Star rated box replaces the 25 plus years old one that ran non-stop, leaked freon into the air and was not repairable. Please note that it has all of the refrigeration equipment on top rather than underneath which means things cannot be stored on top of the refrigerator.

Also take note that coffee is not to be stored inside the refrigerator. The American Coffee Institute does not recommend this practice and it takes up valuable refrigerator space. Your cooperation in not doing these two things will be appreciated.

From David Kenny's letter, dated September 2010 with regard to the Presbyterian Church just south of Pinckneyville, Galum.

"I remember Flossie Langin from the days when her father was the pastor at Pinckneyville and Flossie was quite young. I had several cousins in the church there and from time to time worshipped with them. mother's side of my family, involvement in the church began with Galum and continued in Pinckneyville. My great grandfather was a circuit riding minister who first came to Galum in the 1850's. He soon married the daughter of a family active in the church. That family had come to that frontier area during the 1820's. My father's side of the family, came to Illinois territory in 1811. They were Methodists and the church they helped form is still active a few miles north of Chester, with a large cemetery where many members of my family are buried. The family name was Harmon. I enjoy thinking of all those folks and appreciate reading of them."


