

Pastor's Page

"I just returned from the Happiest Place on Earth in a foul mood. I'm not mad at Disneyland. As always they did everything right, providing an exceptionally magical experience for my family. I'm angry at other customer-facing merchants and businesses who fail to do the simplest things to improve customer satisfaction." So writes Carmine Gallo, in Forbes. Now, Forbes is not my usual read. . .but, yes. . . Disney is - so I was intrigued by what he might say.

Be show ready, he suggests. . . which is one of the Disney keys. "While most Disneyland guests look up at the rides, I look down at the ground. Disneyland is notable for what you don't see—wrappers, gum, or spilled popcorn. I'm always amazed that thousands of people can walk down Disneyland's Main Street and yet it remains spotless. Custodians clean the streets at night so it's "show ready" the next morning. During the day custodians are also hard at work, constantly cleaning, sweeping and picking up. Managers and employees are also trained to make neatness everybody's business."

Make every customer feel important, he tells us. . .which is another key. "Disney employees are trained to be "Assertively Friendly." Disney team members are encouraged to actively seek contact with guests. For example, they will approach an individual who appears confused instead of waiting to be asked for directions."

Finally, **Provide communications training**, for your organization. "Every team member at Disney Parks is trained to be an effective communicator. For example, everything at Disney runs right on time—rides, shows, and trains. If the train is a second late leaving the station, the conductor gets on the speaker and explains exactly why the train is delayed and how long it will be until it gets going. The staff is also trained to answer common questions, even if it's "not their job." One Disneyland employee I talked to even knew the times of a show at another end of the park and how long the show would last."

Three simple things that the make the difference between an amusement park and the World of Disney. Three simple things that would make the difference between this church and any other church. Is our place *show ready*? Do we rely on the same people to make it so? (Thank you to the thankless few who usually do that!) Did you put something on a bulletin board? Then, plan to take it down after a couple of weeks. Did you use a hymnal on Sunday morning? Then, put it back in the pew rack when you are done. Do we *make every person feel important*? Do we know where child care, Sunday school, and the church offices are? Do we anticipate the questions people might have as they come through our doors? Are we *effective communicators* of the mission and ministry of our church, *and of our faith*?

Carmine suggests: The next time you complain about how difficult it is to do business in this challenging economy, take a second look at the way you are doing business. For the church, maybe before we bemoan the loss of glory days and loss of members and our position in the community, we might look at these three **Keys**, and see what we can learn! Little Dresses/Little Britches for Africa

Small Group Ministry is excited to report that First Presbyterian Church in Carbondale will be joining churches from states across the USA in a project called "Little Dresses for Africa". Little Dresses for Africa is a nonprofit , Christian-based organization which provides clothing to the children of Africa and other countries in crisis, when requested, such as Honduras, Guatemala, Philippines, Mexico and Haiti, as well as right here in the US in the Appalachian Mountains and South Dakota.

In addition, there are other ministries that need clothing. Following is the response from Deb Troester who is doing mission work in Africa: "Yes, we could use children's clothing - not just for girls, but for boys and for babies, too. There are around 100 kids between the Bible School and the Theological School, and their parents really can't afford to buy clothing for them. There are 30 students (all but one married), and they all have from one to six or seven children. Each family lives on about \$40 per month or less, plus whatever they can raise in their garden. Obviously, clothing should be for summer-type weather, though long-sleeved shirts and long pants are fine, as long as the fabric is not too heavy."

Samples of the type dresses we will be making are displayed on the Small Group bulletin board in the church narthex. Several of you have already offered fabric or expressed an interest in cutting, ironing, sewing. . . There will be the opportunity to sew either as a group or at home.

We will have a short "organizational" meeting in Fellowship Hall following the worship service on Sunday, May 1. Join us as we launch this new project of providing not only clothing, but HOPE to children in need. Contact Karen Hippensteel (618-684-4282) is you have questions.



May is the last month for the children's Sunday morning Christian Education classes for this academic year. Walter Sickel will meet with the children in grades 3-5 in room 140 as they explore Bible personalities and activities. Camp Carew Scholarship Deadline – May 2

There are only a few days left to turn in your application for a scholarship for Camp Carew. First Presbyterian Church will pay half the registration fee for one week at Camp Carew. BUT, an application for that scholarship has to be in the church office by Monday, May 2.

The Camp Carew booklets are on the counter in the narthex near Fellowship Hall. Sessions begin in June and run to early August. They are for children already attending school; some are short term day time only programs, others are resident camp with 5 nights in cabins or tents. It is always a rewarding experience at this Presbyterian Church camp. We are at an advantage in that the camp is so close to Carbondale, just north of the entrance to Giant City Park.





The dates are July 25-29. Mark your calendar. The planning has begun. Marketplace is for children in grades Kindergarten through fifth grade, (fall 2011) Marketplace is our summertime Christian Education program for children, regardless of church affiliation. 





SEEKING THE FAITH - SHARING THE SPIRIT - SERVING GOD'S PEOPLE

The "Mulch Angels" appeared, perhaps slightly later than normal, mulched the flower beds and then disappeared. If you missed the "Mulch Angels" you can at least view the work they did by checking out the flower beds. We thank them for their efforts.

We continue to look into the acoustical situation in Fellowship Hall and have reviewed data from several web sites on the subject. If the problem were to simply make the room quieter it would be fairly simple, but to make it quieter for conversation and lively for music, which is what is desired, makes it a rather complicated problem. At present the best alternative appears to be to

obtain or make some acoustical panels that can be hung on the walls for most of the time but removed for musical presentations. We will be collecting cost data for this approach and advise you of our progress. We appreciate your patience and we assure you that we are working to find a solution.

In June, we plan to send the control panel for the Sanctuary lighting to the manufacturer for an analysis and to repair any problems found. We feel that the remaining problems in the system date back to the May 2009 storm that knocked out power and caused a surge though the church wiring. We will try to send the panel on a Monday and have it back by Friday of the same week, but there is no guarantee that we will not have a Sunday without lights. We can possibly move our worship service to Fellowship Hall. You will hear more about this as the date approaches.


