We Are Always in Transition

As the calendar flips over to May, I have three things in mind to share with you. All of them are about transitions in some way.

First, all of us in the church, including those folks in our Daycare and Preschool programs, are experiencing a very challenging transition since the Session made its decision to suspend the Daycare effective June 1. I don't need to take this space to say again what has been said in previous letters, emails, and media statements. But I do want to acknowledge the anger and the grief that many of us are feeling as this transition occurs. While it's true that we are all in this together and that God is with is during these difficult times, saying that doesn't take away the pain. But I hope that it reminds us to intentionally practice empathy and work towards reconciliation with one another.

Second, we are trying an experiment for the summer. We will be moving the start of Sunday morning worship a bit later. On Pentecost Sunday, May 19, Sunday worship will begin at 10 a.m. Over the years we have heard that getting out the door and to church by 9:30 can be challenging for some folks. So the Worship Ministry will be checking to see if the new time has an effect on attendance and perceived energy level and simply whether it works for us. I'm pretty sure you can count on some sort of questionnaire later in the summer in order to elicit your feedback.

Third, I hope that you're planning to attend (or at least watch) our radio-style musical murder-mystery melodrama The Brief Case of the Missing Brief Case. The performance is coming right up: Sunday evening May 5. We'll be offering desserts and beverages in the fellowship hall at 6:15 p.m. or so and the plan is for the production to start in the sanctuary (and on Zoom!) around 7 p.m. What does this have to do with transition? Well, it's the next to last of these silly shows I'll be doing with you. I'm hoping that we'll have one last full-blown no-holds-barred production in the fall of 2025 before I retire. So please join us. The donations go towards the Carbondale Laundry project. The cast is very talented and will do the best they can with I give them to work with.

Someone once said that the only constant in our lives is change. I think that's true, so let us live and learn from all the transitions we navigate.



PENTECOST OFFERING ON MAY 19

The **Pentecost Offering** will be received this year on May 19. A gift to the Pentecost Offering helps the church encourage, develop, and support its young people, and also address the needs of at-risk children. 40% of the Pentecost offering is retained by individual congregations wanting to make an impact in the lives of young people



within our own community. The remaining 60% is used to support children-at-risk, youth, and young adults through ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency.

By giving to the Pentecost Offering, our congregation participates in helping our children, youth, and young adults grow

up to proclaim with the Psalmist, "O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds."

FREE LAUNDRY PROJECT

The April Free Laundry Project was one of biggest days yet. The volunteers served 60 people and spent \$600 on laundry. Bill Martens, Jane Swanson and Rick Jefferson volunteered. There were many newcomers. The Tru Earth laundry strips areworking very well and allow for more efficiency and less waste. The next Free Laundry Day will be May 8. 

A suppleement to last month's Earth Day information

At the department store:

Be mindful of clothing purchases. Opt for consignment shopping or "hand-me-downs," if possible. Clothing manufacture, care, and disposal accounts for about 10% of all greenhouse gas pollution. A major source of microplastics in the environment comes from laundry wash water (e.g. from polyester and acrylic fabrics). Natural fibers are better choices. The fashion industry produces 150 billion garments a year, yet only 1% of all discarded clothing is recycled. The average person buys 60% more items of clothing than 15 years ago, but keeps them half as long.

Our final workday will be Saturday, August 24 prior to Labor Day weekend.


In November we will again place flags on graves of veterans in observance of Veterans Day.


