
6. Unfortunately, my recent knee injury had absolutely no effect on my golf game.

A Thank You from Andrew:

Andrew Nyongesa is grateful to First Presbyterian Church. Thanks to our support, he is about to complete a college degree in computer science at the Presbyterian University of East Africa. Below is the text of a recent email from Andrew (for whom English is a second language):

Hello The First Presbyterian Church?

I am Andrew Nyongesa from Kenya. I'm really grateful and emotional for your financial support for my studies. May God bless You . even more together with Mum Ann who has really been of blessings to me. Thank You Church! Happy Sunday. Andrew

Andrew is the oldest of four children of poor subsistence farmers. When he is home from college, he stays and helps at his high school, Living Hope. Andrew would not have been able to attend high school, much less college, without support from American sponsors and churches.

Living Hope High School serves qualified teenagers from families too poor to afford school fees for their children. The school was founded by an American woman in 2009. Despite starting humbly with a box of chalk, four textbooks, a fellow Kenyan teacher, and two buildings, the residential school has grown to prominence in the region.

The compound now has dormitory buildings, classrooms (with electricity), sports fields, a pavilion, a deep well, textbooks, and 14 certified Kenyan teachers. All student costs are covered by sponsorships. In addition to their studies, students tend the cow and chickens, maintain fields of sweet potato and kale, keep bees, and plant bamboo for fuel. Sometimes they make bricks for new structures, paint the mud walls of existing structures, gather bananas, or shell peanuts. Living Hope hires local workers, buys food from local farmers, assists with disaster relief locally, and offers health and education programs for the community.

Living Hope is aptly named. Like Andrew, the young people there come from seemingly hopeless backgrounds. Yet they gain skills, knowledge, and confidence to go forth in their communities. The school has produced teachers, a dentist, a contractor, a hardware store owner, an agriculture specialist, a nurse... and soon an IT specialist.

One might say that Living Hope High School is doing God's work in "helping the least of these." Yet there is no "least" about those involved. The young people are armed with hope for the future and the tools to make that future happen. First Presbyterian is a small part of making that future possible.

Tuck pointing was completed by Brick Works Masonry & Concrete staff who removed and replaced damaged mortar between blocks. Thank you to Facilities Ministry Elders for coordinating these repairs, which together cost approximately \$7,400.

Green Guardians Environmental Moment

Now that the threat of frost is finally behind us, it's time to get into the garden. Whatever your size availability... lots of growing awaits. You might think: beds, containers, vegetable plots, patio edges, or window boxes. A very small space can provide food for butterflies, caterpillars, and birds. How can we help save God's gift to us through our environment at the same time, you may ask? When making your plans this season, try to incorporate some native plants into the mix. These are the best suited plants for our local birds and insects, and are adapted to the climate in our area. Once established, they need much less attention, and most importantly, much less water. Natives provide food for pollinators, provide insects for baby birds (insects have more protein than beef), and seeds later on for everyone. Keep a wildlife-friendly mindset when you are considering changes to your landscape this season. Wildlife-friendly means it supports pollinators, supports the food web, sequesters carbon, and protects our

watershed. By providing food, cover, and sheltered spaces for raising young, we are helping create a continuous food web. A native, wildlife friendly habitat doesn't need to look unkept. Our sensibilities change as we observe how nature uses what we provide. Even just mowing a border around an area we want to enhance with prairie plants will allow that area to look maintained.

So start small...think of replacing a patch of lawn with a plant attractive to pollinators. This mindset also means thinking differently about the traditional "pest." Rather than resort to chemicals to get rid of this insect pest, think about it in the continuum of the food web. That caterpillar or chewing insect might be an important pollinator. Or, it might be an important food source for those birds you enjoy seeing as they are feeding their chicks. Almost all baby birds eat exclusively caterpillars and other insects. Let's help protect our environment.

We cannot believe we are at the end of our school year. The school year has zoomed by and we are excited for summer break and our Summer Session. If you know families with children ages 2-5, we still have plenty of room in our summer and fall classes. Please send them our way.

This month we look forward to the warmer weather and sunshine and celebrating all of our mother figures on their special day. Each class has planted sunflower seeds and we are taking extra special care of them and learning how our plants need water and sunlight to grow. We are excited to see all the sprouts coming up and will be giving these plants to all our mommas for Mother's Day. The Polliwog class will be learning about plant cycles and insects. The Frog class will enjoy a special themed Yoga week, the countdown until graduation, and the bitter sweet sendoff to Kindergarten. We will have a lovely celebration for our preschool graduates with a special sing and potluck at Evergreen Park Thursday, May 19 at 10:30 a.m.



APRIL 1882: Southern Illinois State Normal University had some Church members affiliated with the college. Their "Model School" gave children a sound education for a modest fee.
