

Notes from Kerry

A Lent Well Spent

A quick mental calculation tells me that I have spent 24 of my 31 years in ministry serving a congregation as pastor. That means many things, of course. One of those things is that I've written a newsletter article about the meaning of Lent 24 times now. Fortunately, my memory really isn't all that good. So, I pretty well forget what I've written in previous years. I assume you've pretty much forgotten what I've written about Lent over the past two years as well. It's like we're all starting on a blank slate. Lent is a season on the church calendar that helps prepare us for the celebration of Easter and the resurrection of Jesus Christ. This year Lent runs from March 2 (Ash Wednesday) to April 14 (Maundy Thursday). Traditionally, Lent is associated with fasting and the practice of giving something up as a way of remembering the sacrifices that Christ made for us. Some folks take the practice of sacrifice for Lent very seriously, others not at all ("I'm giving up stewed prunes for Lent," for instance), and others yet have good intentions, but their convictions lose steam as they realize that 40 days is a *long* time. The real intention of Lent, I believe, is for us to remember what God has done- and continues to do. The gospel of John famously tells us that God sent Christ as an act of love for the whole world- and so that those who believe will receive eternal life. It is an act of grace. Lent firmly reminds us that this grace is not something that we've earned but is in fact a qift given to us because God always wants what is best for us.

It was the 18th Century Congregational minister Jonathan Edwards who compared human beings to a spider that God dangles over a fire and who ought to cast us in because of our sinfulness. Now I'm not going to go quite that far (since I'm in a good mood today) but the point is that we rely totally on God and God's grace for everything- including the promise of our own resurrections and eternal communion with God.

So, no, you do not have to break out the ashes and sackcloth this Lenten season. You do not even have to give up chocolate or coffee or Wordle. It will be enough, I think, to take a little time each day to stop and reflect upon just how profoundly deep God's love for us is, that the sacrifices Christ made included us, and that the promises of the Eastertide to come are for us as well.

Yes, it's probably true that I've had thoughts like these dozens of times already in my life and ministry. But that's okay; some things definitely bear repeating.

The blessings of Christ be with you!


needs as well. Please check with anyone on Session if you can volunteer for a specific project or activity, or would like to become an at-large member of a ministry.

According to the Presbyterian Mission website, Ash Wednesday "is a day of solemn assembly...a fast day, a day of mourning for our sin and the sin of all humanity before God, a recognition of our mortality save for the grace of God and a request that the Lord remember our creation and breathe new life into our burned-out, dusty lives once more."

This year's Ash Wednesday Service will be March 2, 2022 at 6 p.m. in the rear of the Sanctuary. Imposition of ashes, communion, and interactive activities will encourage reflection, as—together—we enter the season of Lent. This will be an inperson (not hybrid) gathering, so please try to join us as we are reminded that "though we are dust, we are *baptized dust*, and that makes all the difference."

First Presbyterian Sponsor Circle for Afghan Newcomers Update

Five individuals, John Baker, Cindy Buys, Kathy and Pat Manfredi, and Ann Warner, formed a Sponsor Circle for Afghan newcomers and filed their application Friday, January 28. The application was approved the first week of February and we are now waiting to be matched with our Afghan family. In the meantime, we've been busy preparing a

house owned by Church of Good Shepherd. We are incredibly grateful for all of the financial contributions, donations of furniture and other items, and sweat equity, cleaning, moving furniture, and all the other activity that is occurring in preparation for our family. Stay tuned.



Carbondale Laundry Project Hits Record High

Fifty people took advantage of the Free Laundry Day February 9, including a family with a baby that slept on top of a washer through the entire morning! We were pleased to welcome Pastor Chambers from Bethel AME and Pastor

Kerry from FPC who joined us. Providing laundry services for this large group cost \$300 in quarters, so we are very grateful for the continuing financial support for this ongoing ministry. The next Laundry Day is the second Wednesday of the month, March 9. Volunteers and donations are always welcome.



Supporting our Brothers and Sisters in Mozambique and Malawi

Recently, the church heard from Mphatso Nguluwe, who visited our congregation as an International Peacemaker from Malawi in 2017. She asked for our prayers for the people of Mozambique and Malawi after Cyclone Anna, which hit Mozambique and the southern part of Malawi earlier this year. Many roads, 900,000 homes, and some other infrastructure were destroyed.

Malawi's electricity generation plant also was destroyed which has let to persistent blackouts in the whole country. According to Mphatso, this has put a strain on the hospitals and they are spending approximately \$100 per day to generate electricity in the hospitals where she works. In light of this news, the Mission Ministry agreed to send \$400 to the Synod of Livingstonia in Malawi.



Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) Helping in Kentucky

The PDA National Response Team has been in western Kentucky assessing damage from the recent tornadoes and assisting with rebuilding efforts. PDA focuses on assisting with the financial needs of victims of natural disasters through grants, connecting people to services, and planning for long-term recovery. Synopsis of Session Meeting February 8, 2022

We began the meeting with prayer and brief devotional from The Daily Feast. I once again posed the discussion question "What things do we feel 'locked' into as a church, and is it worth trying to 'unlock' them?" Over the months we've created a pretty long list of items to explore in greater depth. This list is helping me discern what we will be working on during the remainder of my covenant pastorate.

We then moved to a discussion about how to reconfigure the session for 2022, recognizing that we will be down to 12 Ruling Elders to provide leadership for our various ministries. Again, this was a lively and fruitful discussion. We ended up asking Nominating Committee to create a template for the new configuration. We will look at their suggestions (and perhaps tweak them) during the March meeting.

There was an approval of a brief pro forma statement (for the satisfaction of the IRS requirements) that my compensation package as Covenant Pastor does in fact include a housing allowance.

We set Sunday, March 6 as the date for the installation of new Elders and Deacons.

We then proceeded with hearing the reports of the clerk, the treasurer, the ministries, and the Covenant Pastor. All were approved. Here are a few highlights:

Per Capita has been paid to the Presbytery but we need to remind folks to contribute to per capita
giving for this year.
Giving towards the annual budget is off to a great start.
Green Guardians is planning a trashless picnic for April 24 on the greenspace (where else?)
Mission Ministry reported continuing progress in its support of the CAIRS program and its work
with the Church of the Good Shepherd UCC in providing housing for an Afghan refugee family.
Approval of an upgrade in internet infrastructure for the sanctuary and office areas

We concluded with prayer.

It was another good, full meeting in which we did important work. The session continues to thank the congregation for their support. As always, if you have questions or comments about this synopsis, let me or another one of the session members know.


