



#### Why Easter Matters

The earliness of Lent and Easter this year may not be unnerving per se, but it is unusual. I'm nearly always writing about Easter for the *April* newsletter. It's almost like the Groundhog not seeing his shadow has brought about an early spring *and* an early Eastertide.

But that's not to say that we haven't been thinking about the centrality of Easter to our faith. I borrow this small paragraph from the Catholic. com magazine:

Every Sunday—even in Lent—is a "little Easter." We gather on Sundays because it is the Lord's day of resurrection. Sundays are never days of penance. They are always days of celebration of Christ's victory over sin and death.

Easter and its promise of resurrection to new life is almost as foundational to the Christian faith is as our belief in the existence of God and God's triune nature of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. (Or if you prefer, Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer.) In other words, you can't have Christianity without Jesus Christ. Christ was crucified and died on Good Friday and yet was raised again to new life by God on Easter Sunday. It is upon this act that we teach that resurrection is for us all. And with it comes the promise of eternal communion with God.

If everything I've written so far seems extremely basic, then you already know why Easter matters. Easter is God changing the very nature of life and death for us. The door has been opened. The drawbridge lowered. The obstacles (even our sins) have been removed and the way made straight. God's gracious will will always be done.

So, of course, all of this is the best good news there is. But Jesus also warned his disciples not to look past the here and now while imagining what heaven will be like. Following Christ means living out our faith in ways that sometimes call for real courage and a willingness to get seriously uncomfortable. Jesus spoke out against injustice and called for change. He associated with people of little or no status. His mission was to bring the kingdom of God more and more fully into the world. It was his way of putting Easter into action.

Easter Day is almost here, my friends, ready or not. Dye the eggs and buy the chocolate bunnies. But let us also celebrate each and every little Easter joyously. Let us do the Christlike work of making Easter an action verb- in our community and in the world around us.

#### So, What DOES "Maundy Thursday" Mean?

Recorded around 1250–1300, the word maundy comes from the Old French *mande*, in turn from the Latin *mandātum*, which means "mandate or command." The mandate or command at hand refers to the words Jesus is believed to have spoken after washing the feet of his disciples during the Last Supper: "A new commandment I give you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another."

In the ancient world, a host offered water for guests to wash their feet (sandals being the footwear of the day) as a sign of hospitality,

welcoming and care. It was also an act of humility, since servants often washed the feet of their masters. Christians interpret Jesus's washing of his disciples' feet as an illustration of a humble mission of service, or a cleansing of sin. During their final meal, Jesus's new commandment urged his disciples to humble themselves and show forgiveness to all.

Maundy Thursday, March 28, 2024 at 6:00 p.m. in Fellowship Hall, we won't engage in the washing of feet; rather, we will commemorate the Last Supper by partaking in a simple meal of bread and soup, followed by a brief service and Communion. Some cultures believe lentil or bean soup is appropriate for a Maundy Thursday dinner, while others believe any kind of light soup signifies humility and service. If you can contribute soup or bread for this service, please contact Kathy Manfredi or Wendi Zea.

Our Lenten **Faith Dialogues** discussion will focus on *Forgiveness* by Richard L. Killmer. Copies of the material will be available on the table at the rear of the sanctuary; the readings are brief, and you need not necessarily prepare ahead of time. Join us in the Lounge (formerly known as the Youth Room) Sunday mornings at 10:45 a.m. (those who arrive later will be forgiven).

The Green Guardians of First Presbyterian Church celebrates the City of Carbondale's Forestry Management function (part of the Parks department) as it seeks to enhance Carbondale with tree-friendly conservation. We thought you might want to know about some of this good work being done in our community. Arbor Day is April 26 this year.

Here are some accomplishments over the past few years to celebrate City Council goals:

- Named Tree City USA by the National Arbor Day Foundation.
- Received multiple prestigious Tree City USA Growth Awards from the National Arbor Day Foundation.
- As a member of the SIU Tree Board Committee, assisted the university in receiving National Awards as a Tree Campus USA.
- Planted fifty replacement trees throughout the community.
- Continued with an aggressive pruning program to clear residential sidewalks, street lighting, and City streets of obstructing limbs and other vegetation.
- Removed forty-five ash trees infected with EAB (Emerald Ash Borer).
- Removed a total of nine trees that were either dead, dying, or diseased from Turley and Tatum Heights Parks and spaded twelve trees.

#### Further actions the department has pursued include:

- Improve the aesthetics of the welcoming corridors into Carbondale.
- Enhance curb appeal, including in areas adjacent to SIU campus.
- Assess and plant a diverse variety of native trees and plants throughout the community and in parks.
- Promote Tree City USA honors and strive to obtain Tree Growth Award honors.
- Improve and enhance the overall appearance of the community by incorporating best management practices for pruning, planting, spraying, landscaping, and beautification mowing.
- Continue to serve as the Illinois APWA Chapter representative on the State of Illinois Urban and Community Forestry Committee.
- Continue to serve on SIU's Tree Board and Arboretum Advisory Committee.
- Resume Tree Walks with the City Arborist.
- Continue to utilize Ameren's "Right Tree, Right Place" tree grant program where appropriate.

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


